- There is a clear need to reduce the impact of ill-health on the economy and to provide cultural and physical stimulation for an ageing population with more leisure time

- Sport: the rationalisation and more widespread sharing of facilities should continue
- The creation of appropriate affordable events and programmes for the young is essential

The area must be made more interesting, for the benefit of all and to help business attract and retain highly-qualified staff against global competition


What needs doing to improve quality of life locally?


RAND Europe survey for Cambridge Ahead


