Cam Corridor Strategy Report of steering group to plenary meeting on 21 June 2013

1 We need to divide the project into manageable pieces, starting with little detail and making several passes over everything. Initially we should focus on

- Key problems relating to the river and riverside land, with suggestions and recommendations for action to solve them
- Key opportunities for improving the river or riverside land.

In the longer term, the Strategy should include these issues:

historic environment development pressures landscape river flows (high and low) pollution wild life recreation, tourism and river use economic considerations quality of life legal constraints restoration potential

2 Its aims are to

Provide a vision, aims and objectives, and an action plan, to help unlock funding Influence management and maintenance

Feed into the local-plan process

For the last of these to be valid, there will need to be formal consultation.

3 It will be convenient to divide the study into 5 parts:

- A. River Cam through the City: Byron's Pool to Baits Bite
- B. River Rhee
- C. Bourn and Bin Brooks
- D. River Granta
- E. Upper River: Saffron Walden to Byron's Pool
- F. Lower Cam: Baits Bite to Pope's Corner

Particular emphasis will need to be given to the City, much less to the Cam above Hauxton.

4 Before we contemplate employing a consultant, we should assemble as much as possible of our own knowledge. Rob Mungovan and Lou Mayer have made a start (attached). Lou's document should be read together with her maps on http://cambridgeppf.org/river/maps.shtml We should aim to have a complete document by the end of July, with a view to organising a professionally-convened workshop on a Saturday morning in early October. A list is attached of organisations that might be invited to nominate representatives at the workshop. Other organisations that will need to be consulted include

- Anglian Water
- Countryside Restoration Trust
- East Cambs DC
- Uttlesford DC
- English Heritage

- National Trust
- Parish councils
- Residents associations
- Trumpington Farm

We should also invite people to contribute photographs.

6 In due course, we will need to take account of other work, including the River Granta Options Assessment (excerpt attached) and the Green Infrastructure Strategy, http://www.cambridgeshirehorizons.co.uk/our challenge/GIS.aspx

7 We have been advised that the only consultant with the expertise to cover all our interests listed in (1) above would be Atkins, but they would be expensive and employing them would mean to some extent losing control, so that it would be better to employ consultants only to fill particular gaps in our own expertise, if there are any. We recommend reviewing this after the proposed October workshop.

8 We should consider letting the local media know of our project.

9 At our first meeting various organisations said they would be able to help with funding:
CambridgePPF can help with a minor grant and effort.
Environment Agency has £5k for engagement events
City Council can provide a limited amount of money
County Council can try to channel some money from existing budgets
South Cambs can probably provide a small amount of money; if Waterbeach is developed that might yield contributions
Colleges might provide pump priming for imaginative schemes
